Approve #3. Continue to fix our roads and bridges.

Like many states, Rhode Island's infrastructure is in dire shape. It's the result of decades of deterioration and heavier-than-expected use. The harsh realities of New England weather, including this year's record floods, have only made things worse.

An "Approve" vote on Question 3, on November 2, is the only viable way to finance our urgent need for infrastructure improvements. This will authorize the borrowing of \$84.7 million for highway, bridge and transit improvements – making Rhode Island eligible for another \$338.8 million in Federal matching funds over the next two years.

\$423 million in needed improvements. For 20 cents on the dollar.

Rhode Island has no other immediate source of funding for transportation initiatives. So it's more crucial than ever to take advantage of all available Federal monies: which would simply go to other states.

If Question 3 isn't approved, highway and bridge work in the Ocean State will come to a standstill. So will the support of more than 5,000 jobs in construction and related fields. And so will state revenues from related goods and services.



Why fixing roads and bridges is Job One.

According to the 2008 National Bridge Survey by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Rhode Island's decaying bridges are in the worst shape in the nation. 22.3% are structurally deficient. 31.3% are functionally obsolete. Taking the steps to return these bridges to safe, operating conditions is something we simply can't postpone.

The Condition of RI Bridges

Structurally Deficient Requires significant maintenance or repair to continue to carry traffic and eventually will need rehabilitation or replacement to meet current standards.

Functionally Obsolete Built to standards that are not used today, i.e. lane and shoulder widths, vertical clearances, etc.

Employment needs a major boost.

With one of the highest unemployment rates in the nation, Rhode Island can't afford to lose any more jobs. Through a two-tiered effect, infrastructure improvements boost the economy and support more than 5,000 jobs.* First is the direct employment of workers in the construction trades — along with people who supply materials, equipment and specialized services. Second is the indirect generation of jobs when these workers and companies pump dollars into the local and state economies.
